FISHING REPORT

AROUND THE MARKS

The game fishing season for 2014/2015 has finally come to an end but what a way to finish!

The light tackle scene has been great this year. Some days it looked more like a parking lot with both big and small boats rubbing shoulders with everyone trying to stay on the bait. Most of the other known marks also had some great days but as the old saying goes "Find the bait, and you will find the fish".

WHERE THERE'S BAIT...

I have found personally that the latter part of the season was hard to jig bait or even get through the pilchards to get to the slimey's or yakka's underneath. The fish feed on pilchards, so why not use them as bait when the good livies are hard to come by.

Dead pilchards have accounted for 3 of my tagged billfish this year so they are still worth trying. At present the bait is holding on the 18 mile with the gannets and dolphins giving the pilchard schools a hammering.

Sailfish and a few micro Black Marlin are still being tagged and released in this area.

HEAVY TACKLE

The heavy tackle season has had some success with a few Blue Marlin around.

There was a good bite in December at "Never Fail". The weather always dictates how often the boats dare to venture wide. The Gold Coast had a good run of Blue Marlin in the Autumn while a few fish showed up for Mooloolaba Billfish Bonanza.

There were probably quite a good number of heavy tackle fish out there this season but with good numbers of light tackle fish around, most opted to stay on the inshore grounds.

LIGHT TACKLE

The Wahoo have been turning up every so often this year. At times they were schooling up at Hutchinson's shoal down off Moreton Island. They can be fun to catch but make for an expensive day when trolling skirted lures for marlin, unless you are after a feed of Wahoo.

Mahi Mahi have still been caught but not in the number of last year.





The Mackerel on the other hand have been biting their heads off. The reefs off Noosa and the Caloundra 5 and 12 mile marks have been the stand out with a few getting caught around the gneerings. Slow trolling live baits on a down rigger has been the way to go.

There also has been some bigger Black Marlin swimming around the Caloundra 12 Mile area with one eating a hooked Mackerel.

BROADBILL SIGHTINGS

There have been 2 broadbill seen of late. One was spotted tailing on the surface while Mark Bird found the other one in distress and was able to boat it. Thanks for putting that on facebook Mark!

With calming weather on the way, heading out wide for an overnight fish might be an option for those keen fisherman who want to chase this elusive fish.

LIGHT TACKLE

With winter upon us now and snapper to show up some people put their game fishing gear away for the season. With the different weather pattern we have had this compared to the last couple who's to say if the billfish wont hang around through to the spring or continue on. My opinion – at least keep two light tackle outfits on the boat, you just never know!

That's what I have to report, but please feel free to call me on 0412 511 152 to let me know what you have experience while you are out wetting a line.

HOW TO:

X ON THE HEAD SWIMMING YAKKA RIG

X On The Head (Costa Rica Swimming Gar Rig) was invented to troll gar fish but I have altered it to suit a variety of other baits. Yakka's, slimey mackerel and sized tailor all work well.


The Slimey Mackerel are a softer bait so they may have a limited time in the water before a possible blow out. Yakka baits are tough and will last for hours. Tailor Swim better than Yakkas and the Blacks love them. I would love to try pitch baiting for Blue Marlin with big tailor rigged this way.

The way I troll this rig on my boat is by using a large thread line reel fitted with an adjustable du-bro release clip fastened to the reel seat. Placing the bait in the short corner position, I wrap a light rubber band around the main line and place it on the rear bollard. I then open the bail arm and clip the line into the release clip. When a fish takes the bait it snaps the light rubber band, the line pops out of the release clip, thus the fish swims away with no resistance. After giving the fish enough time to swallow the bait, the bail arm is closed. 'Hook Up'!



You'll Need:

- One Yakka
- 50cm of waxed thread
- -1x No.3 Bean Sinker



Double over waxed thread and place through the sinker.




Remove the eyes from the bait, place the loop over the head and position wax thread under gill plates. Position chin weight under throat. Tie an overhand knot over the nose, pull firm.



Pass ends of Waxed thread through each eye socket.

Note: this creates the X on the nose which is where the hook is placed under.



Pass waxed thread ends under front loop and thread back through eye sockets. This will help keep the mouth shut.



Finish off the swim bait by tying the two thread ends behind the weight with a couple of over hand knots.

Note: make sure the weight is dead centre

Note: make sure the weight is dead centre so it will swim true.



Trim the excess thread. Add preferred hook. Limber up bait by flexing from side to side. Place behind boat to ensure bait swims true. Desired trolling speed is 4-4.5 knots.





WHATS COOKING

WHOLE CRISPY FISH



Ingredients

For the Fish

1 x 500gms whole fish cleaned,
scaled, gutted & gilled
Plain flour to coat fish
4 cups vegetable oil for deep frying

Tamarind Sauce
2 tblspns chopped garlic
2 tblspns red chillies
chopped
2 golden or red shallots sliced
1 tblspn galangal finely chopped

(fresh or pickled)
1 tblspn coriander root finely chopped
10 white peppercorns
4 tblspns fish sauce
5 tblspns palm sugar
1 cup tamarind water (below)
coriander or thai sweet basil to garnish

Tamarind Water
1 tblspn tamarind pulp
½ cup boiling water.



Method

To Cook Fish

Heat remaining oil in wok, make sure oil is sizzling hot by testing with a piece of garlic.

Slide fish gently into oil, head first. Using wok flipper, spoon oil over the top of the fish while cooking. This will take about 10 minutes.

Carefully turn the fish over, fry on the second side for about 5 minutes. Carefully lift out, drain on paper towel. Transfer to serving platter, spoon over sauce and garnish with coriander leaves or basil

To Make Sauce

In mortar, pound white peppercorns, add garlic, shallots, galangal, coriander root - pound to coarse paste.

Heat 2 tablespoons of oil in wok and stir fry the paste and chillies until fragrant - about 2 minutes. Add fish sauce, palm sugar, tamarind water the sauce should be sweet, tangy and salty and should be quite thick. If too dry, moisten with a few table spoons of water.

Simmer this sauce for a few minutes for the flavours to come together.

Remove sauce from wok, keep warm.

To Make Tamarind Water

Put tamarind pulp in a bowl, pour in boiling water when cool, mash pulp with a fork and strain the liquid through a sieve retain this liquid, discard the tamarind seeds and skins.

TROPICAL TUNA MAC 10 MEETING

Sydney Fish Markets 2nd May 2014

As the environmental accreditation for the Eastern Tuna Billfish Fishery expired at the end of February 2014 AFMA sought to obtain a further 5-year accreditation, however as the expiry date was reached before a decision had been made, the ETBF was given a 6-month extension until the end of August. This is to allow the Department of Environment to consider the extra documentation provided to them by AFMA and there were no conditions attached to this extension.

The 2013 Annual Meeting of the Western Central Pacific Fishing Conference was held in Cairns in December 2013.

The major item discussed at this meeting was a new measure for Tropical Tuna, which was aimed at reducing the fishing mortality of Bigeye Tuna. The main concern regarding this measure was the potential disproportionate burden that would be placed on Small Island Developing States that are very dependent on Fish Aggregating Device (FAD) fishing. However, this Tropical Tuna measure was not as strict as Australia had hoped due to opposition from the EU or the United States.

New stock assessments that are currently underway are due to be presented to the WCPFC Scientific Committee in August 2014. The stock assessments for Yellowfin Tuna and Skipjack Tuna were


updates, but a major structural review is being completed for Bigeye Tuna. A new measure regarding catch limits for management of Albacore Tuna was also tabled, but support was not given from China or Taiwan.

For the 2014 WCPFC Annual Meeting the main items to be discussed/progressed will be the tropical tuna measure, the Albacore Tuna measure and the compliance monitoring scheme. It is also likely that a shark finning ban will be agreed at the meeting this year.

TTMAC noted that a ban on the take of Silky Sharks within the WCPFC, including the ETBF, convention area was agreed at WCPFC 10 in December 2013. All member countries are required to implement the ban within their own tropical tuna industries.

Because of the issues with the misidentification of Silky Sharks with Bronze Whaler and Dusky Whaler Sharks (being very similar) AFMA has provided an Identification Guide to Commercial Fishers. AFMA also requested that the MAC consider the appropriateness of the current management arrangements for other shark species of similar appearance, namely Dusky Sharks and Bronze Whalers.

This was to also include the possible banning the take of Whaler Sharks, including that by the game fishing



sector, until industry and recreational fishing members also stated that there is currently no scientific evidence that demonstrates any major sustainability concerns for these shark species within the Australian Fishing Zone off the east coast of Australia. It was also noted that the game fishing take is very small. The MAC did not support any alterations to the current management arrangements. Electronic monitoring (e-monitoring) is expected to be installed on boats in the ETBF and WTBF during the current fishing season. The intention and purpose of e-monitoring is to verify logbooks and improve the accuracy of reporting. AFMA stated that if the logbook data accuracy improves to a very high standard, there will not be a future need for physical on-board observers. E-monitoring on board cameras can also identify fish.

The major concern expressed by industry members was the cost of e-monitoring. AFMA explained that a large part of

the cost is for the initial installation, equipment and maintenance visits, and AFMA will also have one full time staff member responsible who will be located in the Canberra office.

Industry members were also concerned that footage may be viewed by the general public, which may create increased negative perceptions of the tuna fishing industry, e.g. necessary killing of landed fish. AFMA will determine what angles/camera shots are required to gain accurate catch information, however the configuration of the cameras will depend on each boat and what works best for them individually. AFMA also stated that e-monitoring footage would be treated as confidential, but subject to Freedom of Information (FOI) laws.

While a cost saving has been achieved in relation to physical observers, industry members stated that an individual saving of approximately \$3,000 per year

was not significant enough. There was disappointment expressed by industry members that previous estimations of e-monitoring costs had forecasted greater savings.

Over time, it is expected that efficiencies will be made and the cost savings for industry will become larger. AFMA agreed that the total cost-saving of approximately \$100,000 is not as large as previously estimated, but stated that a saving of this amount is still significant to industry as a whole. He also noted that there are an additional \$70,000 savings in fee for service for observer costs for the East Coast Southern Bluefin Tuna management zones. In terms of the Southern Bluefin Tuna management zones, Industry appreciated the savings that e-monitoring will create, as it replaces the need for 100% on board physical observer coverage.

Blue & Black Marlin Catch on the Australian East Coast.

All Blue & Black Marlin caught by Australian Commercial Fishers must be released. It is interesting to note that the 2013 East Coast catch of both Blue & Black Marlin were the best for a good number of years.

2013 was also the best season for several years for Marlin Game Fishers along the Qld coast from Lizard Island, north of Cairns, to the Gold Coast and NSW coast to south of Port Stephens. Here on the Gold Coast it was a common sight for boats to return to port with up to 5 tag flags flying. Reports that I have had from

other areas have all been "good fishing." With both the Commercial and Game Fishers' catches both being up it may also suggest that many fish released by the longliners survive.

The next TTMAC meeting is scheduled for late October.
